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### **SIIA Education Division Announces Ellen Bialo as Recipient of First Ever Education Technology *Impact Award***

*Honor was bestowed during SIIA's 2009 CODiE Gala in San Francisco this week*

Washington, DC – May 8, 2009 – The Education Division of the Software & Information Industry Association (SIIA) presented its first ever Education Technology Impact Award to noted Ed Tech industry pioneer, Ellen Bialo, during the 24<sup>th</sup> annual SIIA CODiE Awards Gala in San Francisco this past week.

According to SIIA Education Board sources, Ms. Bialo was selected for the honor due to her pioneering spirit, demonstrated inventiveness, and ongoing (multi-decade) career achievements that have impacted the Education Technology industry. Specifically, for more than 25 years, Ms. Bialo has contributed broadly and deeply to the education software industry in ways that have been significant and fundamental to its healthy growth, as well as to the individuals who comprise it.

According to Dr. Karen Billings, Vice President for the SIIA Education Division, “Ellen Bialo has demonstrated both leadership and mentorship that continues to impact our industry, through her company, her personal time – and through her contributions to members of the Education Division. I can’t think of anyone who deserves this distinctive honor more than she does.”

Ms. Bialo’s career began in the 1980s at the Education Product Information Exchange (EPIE), where she served as director of software evaluation working with the Urban Superintendents Technology Consortium. In 1983, she co-founded Interactive Educational Systems Design (IESD), Inc.—recognized as a leader in research and analysis, instructional design consulting, and materials development. The impact of her work includes a wide range of education market publishers, technology hardware manufacturers, government agencies, non-profit institutions and school districts. Further, Ms. Bialo has served as a “mentor-in-chief” to numerous individuals in our industry.

In the late 1980s, Ms. Bialo started a women’s networking organization called the DOLS which has grown to nearly 350 participants. The DOLS network strives to bring people together to enhance their professional growth in this industry through information sharing, networking, and supporting one another.

Today, Ms. Bialo continues to serve the education technology community by actively participating with major education organizations including the Consortium for School Networking (CoSN), EdNet, and SIIA where she continues to serve on the Education Board of Directors while also co-chairing the Education Division Marketing Committee.
